### Trip to Reeves-Reed Arboretum Sunday, May 7, 2017



Spend a few hours at the beautiful Reeves-Reed Arboretum in Summit! We will carpool from the temple parking lot at 1 pm. Feel free to invite your friends!

The arboretum has a combination of paved paths and grassy areas. To best enjoy the flowers and plants, you must be able to walk safely on grass.

The main building (ramp access) includes an art gallery with rotating exhibits. There are also some short walking trails through a wooded area.

Feel free to bring a snack or drink; be prepared to carry away any trash. No food/beverage service and no trash cans on site.

Admission to the arboretum is free; a \$5 donation per person is suggested.

If it rains on May 7<sup>th</sup>, this trip is cancelled.

#### From the Cantor

We all look forward to the Passover holiday, notwithstanding all the preparation it requires. What draws us especially are the Seder nights when we gather with family and friends to retell the story of our exodus from Egypt. The Haggadah leads us on a journey through the bitterness of slavery and on to redemption, concluding with the final declaration, *B'Shana Habaah B'Yerushalayim* -- Next Year May We Be In Jerusalem!

What are the particular parts of the Seder that make it so special? For some it may be the melodies passed on within families from generation to generation. For others, it is hearing the youngest child chant the *Mah Nishtana*. Or maybe it is Bubbe's knaidlach that she lovingly prepares from a recipe originating in the old country.

I was thinking about the question of whether there is one moment during the Seder that resonates for me in a particularly meaningful way. It is hard to choose just one, but if I had to it might just be the singing of Dayeinu. We all know and enjoy the traditional melody for the refrain, but it is the underlying message of the song that I particularly appreciate. Dayeinu means "it would suffice," and the verses enumerate all the many things that G-d had done for us since taking us out of Egypt, and at each point we declare, that had He stopped and done no more, "it would suffice." It is a song about gratitude; it is a song about finding contentment and appreciating what we already have.

Now let's be honest. An important part of life is striving, and that is not only OK, it is commendable. We strive each and every day to learn more, to earn more, to experience more, to grow more.



No one considers resting on one's laurels to be praiseworthy. Yet even while striving it is well worth pausing every now and then to recognize the blessings we have already received, to fully appreciate and give thanks for them. There may be much that we still wish to accomplish, much not yet attained. But there is surely a great deal for which we can say Dayeinu -- at this moment it is enough.

So at this year's Seder, pause before singing Dayeinu. Pray for a year that is even better than last, and then give thanks for all the many blessings already received.

#### From The Co-Presidents

Last week I saw the play Bad Jews at George Street Playhouse. The play deals with the specifics of a particular family and the legacy of the Holocaust on subsequent generations. It explores many sides of a complicated issue. It deals with the legacy of history and how we live authentically in the present and how we live authentically in the present relationship to the past.

The play focuses on three Jewish cousins mourning their grandfather's death and one cousin's gentile girlfriend. The cousins argue over the Chai necklace that the grandfather hid under his tongue for two years in Auschwitz. One wants to use the necklace to propose to his girlfriend and expresses that the Chai has no meaningful value other than belonging to his grandfather. Another cousin doesn't care about having the Chai and stays on the fence. The third considers herself the only one deserving the Chai because she's the only one faithful to the family and religion by desiring to live the legacy of Judaism and the Holocaust.

Much of the tension between the characters comes from such questions as:

What do we honor more, tribalism or globalism?

What is more important, connection with community or connection with one's identity?

The play approaches these questions, and in light of our country's current divisions over religion, and national policies, identities have never been more visible or so frequently expressed. Nor has there been such a relentless probing of modern Jewish identity as we are experiencing today.

Thus it is imperative to have these questions raised and have people attempt to answer them and defend their philosophy. It makes us take inventory of our own pleas in this moment of history, but it doesn't necessarily say "This is right" or "This is wrong".

### **Passover and Earth Day:** By COEJL

We often talk at the Seder about the Four Children: the Wise, Wicked, Simple, and the One Who Does Not Know How to Ask. We see a little of ourselves in each child as we discuss their place in the Seder and how we explain to them the story of Passover. Do we tell them that we were there together at Sinai, including them in our legacy, or do we exclude them and criticize their apathy?

This year, as we consider Passover's Four Children around the Seder table, let us discover and discuss the tension between our Jewish community's obligation to "till and tend" the earth as God told humankind in the Garden of Eden, and the spectrum of beliefs that many may hold about climate change.

The Wise Child: This child knows that climate change is real and that he must act to combat its effects. The Wise Child has read that global temperatures and sea levels are rising every year, that more species are becoming endangered, and that more communities are experiencing extreme weather events and decreased crop viability. The Wise Child sees all this and is motivated to combat climate change in any way he can.

The Wicked Child: The Wicked Child has read about climate change and is aware that scientists predict a whole range of negative effects if we don't reduce global carbon emissions. But the Wicked Child doesn't think the issues caused by climate change apply to him. He believes climate change will only affect the poor and the vulnerable in places he will never visit. He remains unconcerned.

The Simple Child: The Simple Child is overwhelmed by the idea that humankind could be radically altering the entire face of the earth. He doesn't believe it's possible that scientific predictions are accurate. This child simply ignores the evidence that the problem is real at all.

The One Who Does Not Know How to Ask: This child is much more like The Wise Child than we may typically imagine. The One Who Does Not Know How to Ask has also read about climate change and knows that environmental degradation and the effects on the global population are a real and present threat. Unlike The Wise Child and much more like the Simple Child, this child is overwhelmed. How is this possible? This child might ask, "How can I, alone, prevent this global catastrophe?"
