## From the Cantor



I recently visited a wellknown synagogue in the tri-state area, and I sat in as the religious leader gave a talk on the weekly Torah portion. At some point his talk became overtly political, and his views were unabashedly

on one far end of the political spectrum.

I thought at the moment about how lucky he was, because I doubt if there was even one person in that room who disagreed with him, who might offer a sharp retort. And then I thought about how unlucky he was, because his arguments and his advocacy, in my humble opinion, lacked a certain nuance. He took some very complicated issues, and presented them according to an overly simplistic black and white model. He might have benefited, and his congregation might have benefited, I thought, had there been at least some divergence of opinion and an honest and forthright discussion, indeed debate, on these issues of great complexity.

In our shul, it often happens, that I will have a conversation with someone who expresses, in the most passionate way, views on a highly charged political question, and then a few moments later I will speak with someone else whose views are equally passionate but diametrically opposed. And sometimes I will sit with both as they argue it out. That's a good thing. It is important to hear and understand the other side. Ancient Greek teachers employed an exercise known as Dissoi Logoi to get students to gain a better understanding of issues by having them argue it from the opposing point of view. Our own Talmud has hardly a page wherein there is no argument from different schools of thought.

It is important to argue and debate, but it is no less important to do so with the utmost respect and dignity. In the famous Talmudic debates between the schools of Hillel and Shammai, it is said that the law was almost always according to the thinking of the former, because they made extra efforts to consider first the arguments put forth by their opponents.

In these contentious times, may we, all of us, here and everywhere, be like the students of Hillel. And may we discuss, debate, and even argue, always with respect. And then may we succeed in finding the path that will lead us to a better and to a more peaceful world.


## From The TBOBT Men's Club
