From the Cantor



I was working at my desk the other day, and I asked my research assistant – Google, to come up with something interesting on the subject of the New Year. What I got was a list put out by Time Magazine of "The

Top 10 Commonly Broken New Year's Resolutions." There were no surprises there, just the expected items that included: lose weight & get fit, eat healthier, be less stressed, get out of debt and save money, learn something new, and the like.

Nor was it at all surprising that the list was virtually identical to most top ten lists of resolutions made, such as the one put out by the Nielsen organization. In other words, we tend to make resolutions and then we break them -year after year after year. Resolutions are not easy to keep. If they were, we would just do what we need to do and stop resolving to do so!

Why is it so difficult? First of all we are, to a large extent, creatures of inertia, and anything that takes us off our set trajectory is difficult. Moreover, we have competing needs and desires, so deciding to head to the gym three times a week has to contend with both time constraints as well as the pleasure of relaxing on the couch with the remote control in hand.

But resolutions are important. That is because there is hardly anyone who at any given time is set on a perfect course in life, who would not benefit from some mid-course correction to get to a better destination, or to get there more directly. Life passes all too quickly, and the days turn to weeks, which turn to months and then to years, and before we know it we realize that we have not accomplished the things we recognize as most important. A regular pause, whether it be at the beginning of the New Year, or at the High Holidays, or at any time on the calendar, to contemplate how we might adjust our trajectory is a really good thing and a worthwhile practice.

But I don't really like the term resolution. It just sounds too, well, resolute. I think I prefer the term intention. So I would rather intend to attempt to do the things I want and should do rather than resolve to do so.

And finally, it might be helpful not to begin the whole process with resolutions or intentions, but rather to start by asking ourselves what is it that is important? What do I wish for the coming year, for myself, for my loved ones, for this world that I inhabit, and then to attempt to figure out which resolutions or intentions would best get me to a place where I can see my wishes fulfilled.

As we embark upon this New Year 2017, may all our wishes be ones that are worthwhile, and may we find within ourselves both the will and the way toward their realization and fulfillment.

Tu B'Shevat the greening of Judaism Tuesday, February 14, 2017

Time to Prepare

Tu B'Shevat is the Jewish New Year of the trees. Trees are a metaphor for nature and the environment. The celebration and blessings give thanks for the sustenance and material provided to humans. Originally a time for farmers to record the age of their trees so they would know which trees were old enough to harvest, it has become a time to connect Jewish values of taking care of the earth with contemporary concerns about pollution, climate change and the preservation of the environment.

This year's Project: <u>How Old is your Tree?</u> A Program for Children Ages 7-14 presented by our Men's Club. Knowing the age of a tree can help us all appreciate trees. Normally a forester will take a core-boring into a tree and count the annual rings if he or she would like to know the age of a tree. Unfortunately, this method can be very harmful to a tree, since the boring will leave a hole in the tree which insects may enter. The method for aging trees described below was developed by the International Society of Arboriculture. This method will give a good estimate of a tree's age.

Try This!

- Pick a tree, take a picture and collect a leaf; this helps identify the tree
- Draw an age ring diagram of your tree. (concentric rings with increasing diameter from a center point)
- Mark the rings of your tree by writing in the year on various lines (i.e. mark the lines corresponding to the decades...1990, 1980, 1970, etc.)
- Find years of historic importance--both nationally and locally in your own city--and mark it on your diagram next to the year it occurred.
- Students could ask their parents for the year of a significant event in their past, or for a significant event that occurred in a specific year plotted on your tree line.
- Next, students could ask their grandparents for the year of a significant event in their past, or for a significant event that occurred in a specific year plotted on your tree line.

How does your rate of growth (human growth) compare to the rate and direction of tree growth? What factors can influence both of these rates?


Information needed: English & Hebrew names, including the father's and/or mother's Hebrew name, and secular & Hebrew dates of passing.
